CINEMA VISIT



5 of us went to see Downton Abbey at our local cinema in September. It had everything you would expect from the makers of the TV series. A gentle storyline with nothing to frighten the horses and love prevailed. The costumes were sumptuous as were the locations. Lacock featured as the village where the parade took place. For those of you who don't know it Lacock is a National Trust owned village which often features in period dramas. It is about 20 miles NE of Frome and well worth a visit.

As is the cinema. The Westway cinema, in Cork Street, is a little gem. It is an independent family run cinema which was transformed 2 years ago into a three screen theatre. It might not look much from the outside but it punches well above its weight. We get the latest films and all for £4 per ticket. How amazing is that? At the time of writing the cinema is showing Maleficent: Mistress of Evil, Judy, Downton Abbey, Abominable, Joker, Terminator;Dark

Fate, Shaun the Sheep Movie:Farmageddon, and The Addams Family, The auditoria are quite small (c60 seats) so booking tickets is advised. You can do this online at <u>https://westwaycinema.co.uk</u> (there is a small booking fee) or pop in to the cinema. The cinema has a fully licensed bar and the usual snacks and popcorn are also available, plus an ice cream cart brought out in the intermission between the trailers and the main event. Why bother to go to Trowbridge or Bath and pay their prices when we have this on our doorstep?

FOODY SPOT

For those who like something a bit different and to support a cause try **Longfellow's** – a bit further away but worth the trip. Situated on the campus of Fosseway School at Westfield, near Radstock, it's a small café which offers training opportunities for students who have a variety of needs and which, for some, has led to employment in the catering industry.



The café is open to the public from 8am to 3:30 pm Monday to Friday during term time. It is to the left of the main school building and is accessed by pushing the button on the right of the café door. There is a comprehensive menu of drinks, light lunches and cakes – don't expect chips and regular meals but the soup is good and deciding the choice of sandwich filling can be a challenge. I recommend coronation chicken on granary. All meals are freshly prepared and ingredients sourced locally – even from the school garden which was a real treat to see on my last visit. Breakfasts available until 11am.

It can be a bit of a problem to find parking on the main road.

BRIDGE OVER THE RIVER FROME

You might remember that a while back I mentioned the idea that a foot bridge may be built between our estate and the old Butler, Tanner and Dennis site which is over the other side of the river. Planning permission has been approved, with conditions, for 157 houses. I have recently been approached by the Chair of Friends of the River Frome to discuss this idea further. The group is currently revising a strategic plan for the river to forward to the Town Council and one of the projects is to provide access and links between proposed housing sites such as Edmund Park and Caxton Road (old B, T and D site). A feasibility study has been commissioned to consider the various options and is almost complete and as part of the consultation process The Friends would like to meet with representatives from Edmund Park to get our views and to generally discuss the possibilities. They have suggested a meeting sometime in November. No venue or date has been fixed yet but if you think that this is something you would like to get involved with, or to make a comment about, please let me know and I will inform you as soon as I hear anything.

CHRISTMAS CRAFTS

This one is easy enough to do with children

Glitter paper trees



Materials

Oasis block, Terracotta plant pot, Wooden skewers, Paper – old music sheets, maps, Silver Glitter

Tools

Craft Knife, Small Paintbrush, White Craft Glue (PVA), Star Cookie Cutter, Pencil, Clothes Pin

Method

Cut piece of oasis from the block and fit snugly into pot. Push skewer vertically into centre of oasis, with pointed end at the top.

Take paper in bunches of three or four pages and rip or cut into squares of varying sizes. Push onto skewer, largest first and turn pot as you add pages so the edges are not all lined up evenly. Decrease size of paper so it resembles shape of a tree.

Use paintbrush to brush glue onto edges of paper and then sprinkle with glitter.

Using cookie cutter, or free hand, cut out 2 star shapes and glue together, with the tip of the skewer in between. Use clothes peg to hold together until glue is dry. Pint star with glue and add more glitter.

Wreaths

If you don't have the time or inclination to make your own door wreath try putting a personal twist to a shop bought one.



Twist in real sprigs such as eucalyptus, holly, ivy or spruce. Make sure foliage is fully hydrated by snipping the ends and standing in a vase of water overnight.

Add decorations such as birds, berries, toy soldiers, fruit, cinnamon sticks





Weave in battery operated fairy lights and tie in a large ribbon

WHERE WAS I?



This is the statue of Sgt. Charlie Robbins in front of the Memorial Theatre In Christchurch Street West.

Charlie served in the 2/5th Battalion Gloucester Regiment during WWI. Before enlisting he had worked at JW Singer Foundry in Frome and returned after the war, and carried on working there until he retired in 1960.

A bronze cast was made of him and stood outside the Singer factory, where it remained for many years. It wasn't until 2014, to mark the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of WWI, that the statue was moved from the old Singer building on the Marston Trading Estate to the Frome Memorial Garden outside the Memorial Theatre. The

theatre had been built to commemorate those who died during the War and inside the theatre, in the foyer, are two plaques, installed by JW Singer, naming those who died and the theatre is now the focal point for Remembrance Day Services in November.
