PROPOSED NEW SCHOOL AT EDMUND PARK

I have no further details about the proposed new school apart from the fact that when I spoke to one of the site managers he knew nothing about any plans to build it. The site which has been ear-marked for the school and the NEAP (Neighbourhood Equipped Area for Play) is currently being used by Persimmon for storing materials. It isn't being built on – yet. According to my contact at Frome Town Council the roads will eventually be adopted by Highways when the estate is complete and once all snagging has taken place. The NEAP will go ahead regardless of whether the school gets built. This will offer a great community space for events.

RECIPE A seasonal recipe to get you in the mood for Easter



Hot Cross Bun and Butter Pudding

40g soft butter 6 hot cross buns
300ml double cream
600ml milk 4 eggs
100g caster sugar
1 tsp vanilla extract
apple jelly to glaze

Method

Preheat oven to 160 C. Butter a large shallow oven proof dish liberally. Cut buns diagonally into slices and arrange overlapping in the dish.

Warm cream and milk together. Whisk eggs, sugar and vanilla together in a large bowl. Continue to whisk while adding the cream and milk mixture slowly. Pour over buns and allow to soak for 15 mins. Press buns down gently into custard.

Place dish in roasting tin and pour in enough boiling water to come half way up the sides. Bake for approx. 45 minutes, until set.

Remove from roasting tin. Heat apple jelly to dissolve then brush over lightly to glaze the dish. Serve warm. Mmmm

Easter (and Early May Bank Holiday)

The Somerset Waste Partnership website indicates that there will be no collection on Easter Monday (April 22nd) but a collection the following day – Tuesday 23rd April. That will be for household waste and recycling **NOT** garden waste.

For the Early May Bank Holiday (6th May) there will be no collection on Monday but a collection the following Day — Tuesday 7th May. This will also be for household waste and recycling.

RAIL WORKS

You've probably had a notice from Network Rail but just a reminder that overnight work (10pm to 8am) to upgrade tracks in Frome will take place every Saturday through to Sunday in May. As the work will involve heavy machinery there is likely to be some noise.

ELECTIONS

Frome Parish (Town) Council and Mendip District Council elections will be on Thursday 2nd May. Our ward is Keyford. Polling stations yet to be decided.

Mendip Community Credit Union

In these unstable times, with people often borrowing money with punitive rates of interest, Phil Gray, one of our neighbours has asked us to highlight the Mendip Community Credit Union. I checked out a few pay day loan sites for comparison and they had interest rates between 49.9% APR and 1294.1% APR. Terrifying but legal.

The Mendip Community Credit Union was formed in Wells in 2000 and came to Frome in 2007. Today throughout Mendip it has 1,200 members who have saved over half a million pounds with the Credit Union. This money is being used at present to make over 450 loans to members needing to borrow funds. The MCCU has branches in Wells, Glastonbury, Street, Shepton Mallet and Frome. The service point in Frome is open 10am to 12pm every Wednesday and Saturday in the Library.

The Credit Union is run completely by volunteers, both at the service points and in the back office. Without wages to pay and with no buildings to rent or maintain all the interest earned by lending can be returned to the members as dividend on their savings. (There are some small amounts of expenses paid to volunteers).

100% of members' savings are protected by the Financial Services Compensation Scheme. Like all other credit unions, MCCU is authorised by the Prudential Regulation Authority and regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority and the Prudential Regulation Authority.

The Credit Union is able to lend smaller amounts than banks whose minimum is usually £1k, which is useful if only £200 is needed to buy, for example, a washing machine. The interest rates are low starting at 6.2%, whereas, for example, the Provident has an interest rate (APR) over 500% and loan sharks even more. The types of loan available are always evolving to fit the needs of the members.

The 'hand-up' fund is targeted at helping people who need to borrow a relatively small amount of money for an urgent need, for example, to buy a bed or to pay a utility bill. Traditionally, the Government's Social Fund met these requirements, but many people are now ineligible and the fund also runs dry before the end of the financial year. People are generally referred to the credit union by the Citizens Advice Bureau (although existing credit union members facing real financial difficulty can apply directly – contact the credit union if you think you might qualify). WALK



This month's walk of 3 miles is around Nunney – a beautiful village with a castle, just over 3 miles south west of Frome.

Start the walk at the free car park up Castle Hill SP736457



Walk through the gate into the open field and follow the path to your right, through the arbour to the path junction and turn left.

Walk along a hedged pathway to an open field. Walk diagonally across this field down to Nunney brook. Do not cross the brook via the ford but go through a gate and then cross over the bridge, turn left so that the brook is on your left.

Walk some distance through the wood, and when you reach a bridge cross it and turn immediately right with the brook now on your right.

Eventually you will reach another bridge where you climb up the path on the left and then turn right and cross over the bridge. Climb up to some field gates and go through a kissing gate between them. Keeping the hedge on your right walk downhill to kissing gate.

Go through this, hedge on your left, until you see a kissing gate in the hedge.





Go through this and turn right, following the path around the corner of the field and carry on to a kind of crossroads of fields and tracks. Bear right with the hedge on your left and walk downhill. When you reach the bottom walk into next field and follow path diagonally upwards.





Go through a pair of kissing gates and walk to the left of this field with hedge on your left. After some distance go left through another kissing gate, hedge now on your right.



Go through 2 kissing gates to cross a lane and, keeping hedge on your right, walk to another kissing gate into a pathway between hedges. Carry on along this pathway, through a metal structure to an old kissing gate. Turn left to continue along the lane to another kissing gate on your right. Go through this into a lane, past large houses and on reaching the road turn left, then right into the village.

There are two options now depending on whether you want a drink or not. If not then walk between some houses on your right, before you reach the pub, and cross over a footbridge towards the castle. At the end of the footbridge carry straight on and turn right into Castle Hill and back to the car park.

Or if you do want a drink follow the stream on your right and walk to the George inn, on your left. Outside seating is next to the stream or through the pub into the garden. When you have refreshed yourselves walk on past the pub to the bridge. Turn right over the bridge and up the hill and back to the car park.

If you have a walk that you can recommend please let me know and it can go into a future issue.

Talking of walks, did you know that free guided walks around Frome take place from May to September on the second Sunday of the month? The walks leave at 2:30pm from the Round Tower, Justice Lane (adjacent to the Market Square) and are designed to give an understanding of the development of the history and economy of the town from its foundation in 685 AD by St Aldhelm, through the middle ages to the present day. There is special emphasis on Frome's listed buildings with their broad range of religious and vernacular architecture.
